When students, teachers, and staff were called to an assembly on Tuesday, September 19, it was clearly for something very important. With Board of Education members and District officials in attendance, our principal made a big announcement: J.F. Tatem Elementary School has been named a National Blue Ribbon School for 2023. The crowd went wild!



Each year, the U.S. Department of Education issues a limited number of awards to schools with outstanding overall student performance. The award also recognizes the amazing work done by teachers and staff.

Principal Donnetta Beatty told us that the award "is a result of real teamwork, talent and hard work by all members of our school family." We all felt so proud.

Tatem is one of only nine New Jersey schools to receive the honor this year, the only one in South Jersey, and one of just 353 schools nationwide.

We are the third Haddonfield school to be awarded a coveted Blue Ribbon. Memorial High School was honored in 2004; Elizabeth Haddon Elementary received the award in 2015.

Celebrating Haddy's 20th

Do you know why there's a massive dinosaur sculpture in the middle of downtown Haddonfield? Do you know its importance?

Did you know that the creator of the sculpture is a resident of Haddonfield? Did you know the sculpture was made in a studio on West End Avenue in Haddonfield?

Well, the Tatem NewsCrew revealed these answers – and more – when they met with renowned sculptor John Giannotti on October 18, 2023, twenty years after the unveiling of the sculpture, now known as Haddy.

The Hadrosaurus *foulkii* was the first dinosaur with its fossils ever found. The bones were discovered in 1858 in a marl pit at the end of what is now Maple Avenue. They were taken to the Academy of Natural Sciences in Philadelphia, where they were studied. Scientists came to the conclusion that the bones were from a very large unknown creature. This was a major historic find for Haddonfield.

In the early 2000s, the Haddonfield Garden Club decided to publicly acknowledge the Hadrosauraus by creating a sculpture in honor of the dinosaur. The Club met with a number of sculptors from throughout the region and finally decided that John Giannotti, a Haddonfield resident, was the best fit for the job.

Mr. Giannotti gladly took the job offer and began his work in his studio – a former barn in his backyard. He arranged for students from the elementary schools to pick a spot on the sculpture and place their very own piece of clay. The students were fascinated by the process and were so thankful. Mr. Giannotti knew this was a moment they would never forget.

Finally, after more than a year, the last part of the clay form was finished. Mr. Giannotti shipped off the mold to a foundry for casting in bronze. A month later, the sculpture was ready to be revealed.

Color bomb!

By the end of the run students (and some parents) were covered head to toe with chalk. Teachers greeted the runners at the finish line with snacks and treats. The non-toxic chalk washed off easily with a quick shower. Unfortunately, the beautiful colors also washed out of the tee-shirts.

Tatem's very first color run was extremely fun and a huge success.





Ingredients:

1 120z bag of butterscotch chips

- 1/3 cup margarine
- 2 cups graham cracker crumbs 1 cup chopped nuts (optional) 1 egg
- 1 8oz bar of cream cheese

14oz can of sweetened evaporated milk

1 tsp. vanilla extract

Method:

Preheat oven to 350 degrees (325 degrees for glass dish). In a large saucepan, melt morsels and



margarine, stir in crumbs and (optional) nuts.

Press half of the mixture firmly onto the bottom of a greased 13×9 pan. In a large mixing bowl, beat the cream cheese until fluffy; beat in condensed milk, vanilla, and egg. Mix well.

Pour into prepared pan; top with remaining ingredients. Bake 25 to 30 minutes or until an inserted toothpick comes out clean. Chill before cutting.

The day of the unveiling came: Saturday, October 18, 2003!

The intersection of Kings Highway and Chestnut Street was jam-packed with a crowd of over 2,000.

When they arrived, everyone noticed that a colorful parachute was covering the sculpture. A rope attached to the parachute was ready to be pulled.

While the crowd waited patiently, two members of the Garden Club gave speeches, as did Mr. Giannotti and Mayor Colombi.

Then, with everyone's eyes on the parachute, and as music blared from a sound system, the mayor led everyone in a countdown. When they reached zero, a firefighter on the roof of a nearby building yanked the rope with all his strength and the parachute flew up, revealing the massive sculpture.

The crowd burst into cheers as they looked up in awe at the beautiful creature. Everyone loved it!

To this day, passers-by stop and gaze admiringly at Haddy. Children throw coins into the rocky waters below the dinosaur's feet.

After 80 million years and two decades, Hadrosaurus *foulkii* continues to bring recognition to the important role Haddonfield played in the history of paleontology.
